

**Subject:** Heathrow and Airspace Modernisation

Dear HCNF member,

I am writing to update you on Heathrow's plans for airspace modernisation to deliver the Government's Airspace Modernisation Strategy - the national programme to modernise and upgrade the UK's airspace.

Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic has meant that we have had to review how the airport can progress the changes required to keep pace with the national airspace modernisation programme.

You may be aware that Heathrow was previously progressing its Airspace Change Proposal (ACP) for airport expansion and had widely consulted on these plans in 2018 and 2019. This ACP also incorporated the changes required for airspace modernisation. The ACP for an expanded Heathrow was paused on the Civil Aviation Authority's (CAA) portal last year and our expansion plans have been paused whilst the business prioritises recovering from the impacts of COVID-19. We appreciate that this current external uncertainty about Heathrow expansion will be difficult for the communities around the airport. Heathrow remains committed to working with those impacted and will ensure that local communities are kept informed as any plans change.

Whilst our expansion ACP remains paused, Heathrow continues to be committed to the Government's Airspace Modernisation Strategy and to working with other UK airports to redesign our flight paths to modernise the design, technology and operations of airspace. Accordingly, we will be submitting a new ACP to the Civil Aviation Authority to progress the necessary changes, based on our existing two runways.

We will share more information with you later this year as we develop these plans but wanted to let you know in advance of submitting our Statement of Need (which briefly outlines Heathrow's proposals) to the Civil Aviation Authority. We will be engaging and consulting on our airspace proposals throughout the process with a wide range of stakeholders, including potentially affected communities.

We are still working on much of the detail, and it will be several years before any airspace changes are designed, approved and implemented. We will be covering this at the next HCNF meeting on 28 July so there will be an opportunity to raise any questions you may have at this early stage.





# 1 Welcome and Introduction

1.1	Director of Communities and Sustainability at Heathrow, welcomed members and guest presenters to the virtual forum and noted apologies for absence. She welcomed new members (Elmbridge Borough Council) and who replaces as Operational Impacts and Community Engagement Lead at Heathrow.
1.2	noted that no comments had been received on the previous meeting notes from 28 April, so these will now be marked as final. She went through the previous actions as detailed below.
1.3	Arrange a dedicated meeting on higher climb rates (2.12).  advised that he had met with from CAA and who carried out a departure noise study for the community groups in his former role as independent technical advisor to the forum. He had also spoken to and others to establish the best way forward, which will involve having a further session with a small group before reporting back to the forum with next steps.
1.4	Confirm whether Heathrow will fund to attend the dedicated meetings (2.13). confirmed that would be funded to attend the meetings.
1.5	Collate questions on higher climb rates that had not been fully answered (2.14).  advised that these had been collated for use at the dedicated meeting. asked if they could be shared, and confirmed that they could.
1.6	Arrange an agenda item to discuss how the Airspace Change Proposal (ACP) process will work in relation to Airspace Modernisation (5.5). advised that from the Airspace Change Organising Group (ACOG) will discuss this later in the meeting.
1.7	provided a short business update. She advised that Heathrow's financing remains resilient despite growing losses due to Covid-19 which now stand at £2.9bn. Heathrow has reduced its cash burn by over 50% and has taken financing action to cover its commitments until October 2022. She noted that less than 4 million people travelled through Heathrow in the first six months of 2021, a level that would have taken just 18 days to reach in 2019. Despite recent changes to the traffic light system, testing requirements and travel restrictions could see Heathrow welcome fewer passengers in 2021 than in 2020. She added that the UK was falling further behind its European competitors, with cargo volume 18% down on pre-pandemic levels while Frankfurt and Schiphol were up by 9%. Trade routes between the EU and the US have recovered to nearly 50% of pre-pandemic levels while the UK remains 92% down.
1.8	noted that throughout the pandemic, the safety and security of passengers and colleagues has remained a priority, so Heathrow was proud to have gained recognition from the Airports Council International and the CAA for the measures put in place throughout the terminals. Heathrow has also been awarded a 4-star Covid-19 Airport

Safety Accreditation by Skytrax, the highest achieved by a UK airport.

1.9 advised that traffic levels in July so far have ranged between 430 and 624 daily movements, a long way down on Heathrow's pre-pandemic levels of 1,300 daily movements. She explained that future traffic levels remain uncertain as airlines continue to adjust their schedules to react to external events and government announcements.

# 2 Community Forums Review Update

- 2.1 gave an update on the review of Heathrow's engagement channels which was being undertaken due to the impacts of Covid-19 on the business. The presentation is provided alongside the meeting notes. She reiterated that Heathrow had consulted with stakeholders in January and thanked those who took the time to participate in the consultation process. Initial proposals for a new forums structure were now being worked on to streamline Heathrow's engagement and make it more effective.
- 2.2 advised that Heathrow plans to hold a new quarterly Noise and Airspace Community Forum (NACF), replacing the current HCNF but with a similar structure. It is proposed for the new forum to have an independent chair to ensure the right balance is struck between Heathrow's agenda and that of the community. Many consultation respondents also felt that it was important to engage with a wide range of diverse stakeholders to ensure a variety of voices and opinions around the table. In noted that Heathrow will be looking to engage with new groups over the coming months and welcomed feedback from members on any groups that might be good additions to the forum. She also advised that the new forum would have a new code of conduct which all attendees would be asked to adhere to. She explained that Heathrow was also looking to create stronger links between forums, so the new NACF will be directly involved with the new version of the Heathrow Community Engagement Board (HCEB). She advised that the overall forums structure was not yet complete, and the need for sub-groups or working groups would be considered where they would be most useful, noting that some groups could convene as and when needed. She reiterated that these were initial thoughts and built into a wider forum structure which was still being worked through. More detail will be provided in the coming months and members were encouraged to submit feedback after the meeting.
- asked if the same independent chair would be used for all forums.

  advised that this was not the expectation, although it would not be ruled out if the right person came through the recruitment process. However, the best candidate for each forum would be sought and the NACF chair would be expected to have a certain amount of technical knowledge.

  asked if the appointment panel for the independent chair would include community representatives.

  confirmed that it would, and that more information would be provided as the plans develop.

# 3 Reducing Departure Noise – Next Steps

3.1 put forward his proposals for the next steps to minimise noise disturbance from departures based on study. The presentation is provided alongside the meeting notes. He asked to confirm the timescale for the dedicated meeting on the issue. In noted that presentation raised a number of questions including the interpretation of the Aeronautical Information Publication (AIP). He explained that had limited availability in August so the meeting would most likely be at the end of August or start of September, with 6 or 7 people involved to come up with the next steps and move the debate forward.

3.2 claimed there was an increase in low flights over her area 13 miles explained that increases in the frequency of aircraft from the airport. could be due to changes in demand as the impacts of Covid-19 change for different countries. She added that some locations at these distances were affected by aircraft required to be positioned below arrival tracks due to other traffic, as current airspace is inefficient and needs to be modernised. asked which routes were affected by this issue. responded that she would provide examples. [Post meeting clarification: It later transpired that was located under a Noise Preferential Route (NPR) just 6 miles from the airport. It would be rare to see aircraft levelling off due to other traffic within the NPRs, this is more commonly seen further out. Within the NPRs there can be range of altitudes due to factors such as weather conditions, aircraft type and aircraft weight. A presentation covering both regions and factors that can influence aircraft heights within each will be provided at the next meeting, including common regions where aircraft may be impacted by other traffic.]

# 4 Early Morning Arrivals

- 4.1 gave a presentation describing the history and new location of Hong Kong Airport, resulting in flight paths which overfly the sea and avoid the population centre or only overfly it after 30km. He noted that flights now operated through the night at Hong Kong, so the early morning British Airways flight could now depart later and arrive at Heathrow after 07:00. He suggested that the historical legacy of early morning arrivals at Heathrow was therefore no longer relevant and asked for details of the economic benefit they provide and whether that would still hold true for forecast demand levels. The presentation is provided alongside the meeting notes.
- 4.2 asked DfT to review the historical early morning arrivals slots where Far East airports can now operate at night without impacting their local population and very early arrivals into Heathrow could be pushed back later. asked for a copy of his questions and he responded that he would send them by email. advised that although the impact of night flights at Hong Kong was much reduced, they still had a night quota system in place and communities impacted by night-time operations.

# **5** Managing Aviation Demand and Emissions

- gave a presentation on global and UK aviation demand and carbon reduction initiatives. He stated that no single initiative would achieve Net Zero Carbon and put forward a number of recommendations including carbon pricing, air passenger duty and a quota scheme to manage efficiency, hybrids and sustainable aviation fuels. The presentation is provided alongside the meeting notes.
- thanked for this presentation and noted that everyone had the opportunity to submit their views as part of the government's decarbonisation consultation. She advised that the issue was a priority across government, that they had started mobilising actions and those should start coming out over the next few months. She noted that ACOG's airspace modernisation masterplan would also provide more details of airspace changes that would bring benefits for carbon, noise and capacity, so that would also need to be considered and the conversation would continue over the next few years.

5.3	agreed that carbon was an important issue and a focus at Heathrow. She noted that former HCNF chair was now leading on carbon strategy and suggested that his team could provide a presentation at a future meeting to show what Heathrow was doing in this area. However, she was aware that the HCNF was a noise forum and asked to find out if community group members would like carbon covered at future meetings. suggested an alternative option would be for to meet prior to a summary presentation at the next meeting.
5.4	felt that noise and carbon were both important issues and it might be useful to have one or two meetings a year that linked both areas. However, he considered noise to be a large enough topic for this group and members interested in emissions should engage with the relevant workstream instead.
5.5	asked if the DfT would be considering other climate change impacts that aviation has on the upper atmosphere, with DG citing contrails and CO2 levels as examples.
6	Airspace Modernisation and the Role of ACOG
6.1	gave a presentation outlining ACOG's role to coordinate the delivery of key aspects of the UK Government's Airspace Modernisation Strategy, including the development of a masterplan to identify which individual but interdependent airspace design changes need to be developed together to deliver the range of benefits that modernisation will bring. The presentation is provided alongside the meeting notes.
6.2	asked if ACOG had looked at the introduction of NextGen in the USA, saying that it had led to legal challenges due to community concerns. said he would speak to after the meeting to discuss the lessons learned from this.
6.3	noted that ACOG's programme would be managed according to government policy based on the Survey of Noise Attitudes (SoNA) which he claimed was not robust and did not take account of change impacts. He asked how much ACOG has discussed the issues with communities who understood them and stated that any growth would result in more community impact. advised him that the airspace proposals would be developed by the airports following the CAA's airspace change guidance CAP1616 which provides an opportunity for local stakeholders to have their say on issues such as noise impacts. He emphasised that ACOG would not be creating airspace designs, their role was to ensure optimisation of the overall system such as where there was potential for overlaps in designs, a need for deconfliction and to ensure designs fit together effectively.
6.4	noted that NATS had produced figures in 2017 around delays and punctuality based on substantial increase in demand and asked if WebTAG analysis would be done on this.
6.5	asked if the government's £5.5m funding for airports to develop and evaluate design options was just for Heathrow or the whole of the UK. advised that it was for all airports and would be distributed according to the work steps that each airport has to follow. # 7 Heathrow's Airspace Modernisation Plans

7.1	presented an update on Heathrow's airspace modernisation plans, explaining that Heathrow was commencing an airspace change for the current two-runway environment to meet the government's timeline for airspace modernisation. This will modernise and redesign all arrival routes into and out of the airport. She noted that expansion plans remained on pause as Heathrow prioritises recovery from Covid-19. She stated that the aim of this new airspace change is to minimise the number of airspace changes, as well as future changes needed, with the requirements for the redesign of the Compton departure route, easterly alternation and parallel approaches

- 7.2 asked if all of the flight path changes would be included in one airspace change proposal. confirmed it would be designed as one airspace change although it was possible it may be deployed in phases, it was too early to know at present.
- 7.3 asked if Heathrow's airspace modernisation plans would include any changes related to expansion. reiterated that the airspace change would be based on Heathrow's existing two runways. However, where possible, Heathrow would seek to minimise further airspace changes (for the routes to their current two runways) required for any future expansion of the airport.
- sounded like expansion and added that IPA would harm communities by sending arrivals over new residential areas. The asked if IPA would be used as part of the process to improve efficiency or add more flights. The acknowledged that IPA had a contentious history but explained that it was just a technology that makes both runways independent of each other. He explained that it did not mean that Heathrow was proposing to look at the previously discussed flight paths for IPA, just that Heathrow would look at how technology could be used to remove the dependency of the two arrival streams within this re-design of the airspace. He added that the airspace change proposal was not seeking to increase capacity above the current 480,000 movement cap; any such increase would have to be sought through the Town and Country Planning Act or a Development Consent Order.
- asked if it was possible to highlight where airspace changes would improve the noise environment. explained that the design process had not started yet. The first discussion would be around the design principles which would then be used to shape the proposals, so it was not possible to give examples yet. thought this should be at the forefront of the design principles, and divised that he would be able to provide that feedback during the first stage of the engagement process.
- was concerned that improving efficiency and reducing fuel burn were considered more important than noise with regard to IPA. responded that reduced fuel burn would provide an emissions benefit, and if it resulted in reduced holds it may reduce noise in some areas. noted that the previous design principles consultation included noise in the design principles and so had the potential to be the case again, subject to the feedback in the engagement. responded that noise should be included as part of the objectives. davised that DfT and CAA have specific rules on altitude-based priorities, where noise should be a priority and where emissions should be considered. added that noise would be a key area of focus in the airspace change proposal and his role would include seeking out opportunities to reduce noise impacts. reminded members that they would have a chance to provide their views as part of the design principles stage of the process and members to participate in this.

# 8 West of UK Airspace Deployment

8.1 gave an update on airspace changes taking place in the west of the UK, involving the systemisation of routes to enable a new route network above 7,000ft and the introduction of Free Route Airspace above 24,500ft. The presentation is provided alongside the meeting notes. He advised that the changes would affect Heathrow operators but there should be no noticeable affects at Heathrow or the surrounding area. He added that an industry consultation would take place later this year prior to planned implementation in 2023, but members were also welcomed to comment if they wished.

# 9 UK Aeronautical Information Publication (AIP) Administrative Updates

advised members of a number of administrative changes to the Heathrow Aeronautical Information Publication (AIP) which will come into effect from September 2021. He explained that this was purely an administrative amendment to align multiple sections of the AIP, so it did not involve changes to tracks over the ground or changes to procedures flown today. suggested that the update would be an ideal time to address steeper departures and descents. reiterated that the changes were purely administrative, and that any change to a procedure would have to go through the regulatory change process.


# **10 AOB**

### 1. Background

Heathrow has committed to the UK's national airspace modernisation programme and had intended to deliver airspace modernisation as part of the airspace change for an expanded, three-runway airport.

Our Expansion plans have now been paused, along with the Airspace Change Proposal (ACP) for an expanded Heathrow, whilst we prioritise recovery from the impacts of COVID-19.

Heathrow continues to be committed to the Government's Airspace Modernisation Strategy and to working with other UK airports and NATS to redesign our flight paths to modernise the design, technology and operations of airspace.

To achieve this aim, Heathrow has started a new ACP for Airspace Modernisation.



As part of this airspace change we are seeking to reduce the number of ACPs, as well as future changes needed, with the requirements for the redesign of the Compton departure route, easterly alternation and parallel approaches captured within the new airspace change – rather than progressed separately. The Slightly Steeper Approaches ACP has now been approved by the CAA.

We are commencing Stage 1B of the required seven-stage CAP1616 process and are now engaging with you, as one of our stakeholder representatives, on design principles specifically for this new ACP.



## 2. The UK's Airspace Modernisation Strategy

The Department for Transport (DfT) and the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) are working together as co-sponsors for the modernisation of the UK's airspace.

Modernising airspace means updating its structural design, changing the systems on which it runs, and using new technology to improve how air traffic is managed.

The overall objective for airspace modernisation is to deliver quicker, quieter and cleaner journeys and more capacity for the benefit of those who use and are affected by UK airspace.







The Airspace Modernisation Strategy (AMS) outlines the work that needs to happen to modernise airspace. Improving flight paths is just one aspect of this strategy.

Other areas that the AMS must deliver on are improvements in safety, efficiency, integration, environmental performance, defence and security and international alignment.

## 3. The programme

The aviation industry is working together to deliver airspace modernisation through a coordinated programme.

More than twenty UK airports and NATS are involved in the delivery of this national programme of airspace change, which is being co-ordinated by the Airspace Change Organising Group (ACOG).

Airports are responsible for designing the arrival and departure routes that support their operations from the ground to around 7,000 feet. They also take responsibility for the way the airspace is used and developed in this lower portion of airspace

NATS is responsible for the route network, and for the way the airspace is used and developed above 7,000 feet. NATS is also responsible for re-designing the airspace above 7,000 feet.



## 4. The airspace change process



Every organisation that sponsors an ACP must follow the regulatory process for changing airspace design. This is known as CAP1616. It is divided into seven stages.

The first stage in the process is known as DEFINE

Step 1A has already been completed and this public information can be viewed on the CAA Portal by <u>clicking here</u>

We are now at Step 1B, which is where we develop our design principles through discussion with potentially affected stakeholder representatives.

Heathrow's proposed design principles and evidence of this engagement activity will be submitted to the CAA for review.



Develop & Assess

### **Step 2A Options Development**


Heathrow will develop a first comprehensive list of options, which address the Statement of Need and align with the design principles from Stage 1.

We will come back and engage at this point.

Heathrow will then produce a design principles evaluation on this comprehensive list, setting out how its design options have responded to the design principles.

### **Step 2B Options Appraisal**

Each option is assessed to understand the impact, both positive and negative. This is an 'Initial' options appraisal, containing qualitative and where possible, quantitative assessments of the different options.





### **Step 3A Consultation Preparation**

Heathrow prepares its consultation strategy and consultation documents including a more comprehensive 'Full' options appraisal.

### **Step 3B Consultation Approval**

The CAA reviews the consultation strategy to ensure the strategy is comprehensive, the materials clear and appropriate, and the questions unbiased.

### **Step 3C Commence Consultation**

Heathrow launches a full public consultation (usually 12 weeks).

### **Step 3D Collate & Review Responses**

Consultation responses are collated, reviewed and categorised by Heathrow.



### **Step 4A Update Design**

Heathrow will consider the consultation responses, identify any design changes needed and update designs for the 'Final' options appraisal, submitting these to the CAA for review.

### **Step 4B Submit Proposal to CAA**

Heathrow will prepare the formal Airspace Change Proposal using the template in CAP1616, and submit it to the CAA.




### **Step 5A CAA Assessment**

The CAA reviews and assesses the ACP and may offer a Public Evidence Session. The CAA may request minor changes to the proposal.

### **Step 5B CAA Decision**

The CAA decides whether to approve or reject the ACP. Alternatively, the Secretary of State may also 'call-in' the proposal and make the decision.


### **Stage 6 Implement**

Heathrow implements the proposed change, working with air navigation service providers such as NATS.

### **Stage 7 Post-Implementation Review**

The CAA reviews how the airspace change has performed, usually 12 months after implementation, to check whether the anticipated impacts and benefits have been delivered.

## 6. Stakeholder engagement



CAP1616 sets out the stages where Heathrow is required to engage with stakeholders about its proposal

## 7. Heathrow's proposal

Heathrow has started a new ACP for Airspace Modernisation.

Step 1A of the process required Heathrow to submit a 'Statement of Need' for our Airspace Change Proposal.

The Statement of Need must clearly set out why an airspace change is being considered.

Following the submission of the Statement of Need, Heathrow held an assessment meeting with the CAA to discuss the proposed change. The presentation and minutes from this meeting are publicly available on the CAA Portal and you can see them by <u>clicking here</u>.





### Statement of Need (1 of 2):

"The Government published its Airspace Modernisation Strategy (AMS) in 2018. The AMS lays out a national programme to modernise and upgrade the UK's airspace and sets out the work required of the aviation industry, including UK airports, to deliver airspace modernisation.

A masterplan is now being created by the Airspace Change Organising Group (ACOG) to coordinate the delivery of airspace change across UK airports and NATS En Route Limited (who is responsible for the airspace above/beyond the airports' areas of responsibility).



Heathrow's current departure and arrival procedures were designed decades ago, at a time when aircraft and navigation were much less sophisticated than today. Through the introduction of airspace modernisation at Heathrow, the airport will make use of modern navigation technology to enable better aircraft performance, reduce delays and manage traffic in ways that mitigate, where possible, the impact on local communities.

Heathrow will also play its part in delivering the requirements of the UK's AMS, such as maintaining and enhancing high aviation standards, ensuring the efficient use of airspace, avoiding flight delays by better managing the wider airspace network, and improving environmental performance by reducing emissions and noise impacts on local communities."

## 7. Heathrow's proposal

### Statement of Need (2 of 2):

"Heathrow had initially proposed to undertake airspace modernisation through its Airspace Change Proposal (ACP) for Airport Expansion, but the Expansion project is on pause as the current priority is to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic.

However, Heathrow remains committed to the airspace modernisation programme and is therefore proposing to progress the changes required to keep pace with the wider UK programme, via this new ACP, based on our existing two runways.



Through the new airspace design, Heathrow will seek to minimise the impact of potential future changes to its airspace design as far as is practical, such as those that may result from the developments of future navigation technologies, the introduction of Urban Air Mobility (UAM), other anticipated aircraft fleet changes, or expansion of the airport."

## 8. What is a design principle?

The design principles are the objectives that the airport seeks to achieve through the airspace change, and help the airspace designers to create and compare different flight path design options.

Design principles include policy, safety, environmental and operational factors.

Some are core requirements that we need to include, such as Government policy, but there are other options and tradeoffs to choose between when designing future flight paths.

The design principles must also consider the local context for the airspace change to take account of priorities within the area affected, so a **new set of design principles is developed for each ACP**.



Although we have engaged previously on design principles for earlier ACPs, directly applying design principles from a different airspace change (for example, one of Heathrow's previous ACPs) may not be appropriate.

The context of each proposal is different and priorities and opinions may have changed since Heathrow previously engaged with stakeholders.

The design options are only evaluated against the design principles in Stage 2A. After that, all formal appraisals are assessed against policy.

## 9. How are design principles used?

Design principles can be grouped into broad themes based around some fundamentals such as:

- Safety
- Policy
- Noise
- Environment
- Technology
- Operational Performance

These are the themes we will be discussing with you during the workshop.



### **Prioritisation**

The workshop discussions will aim to identify common priorities amongst stakeholders. The CAA acknowledges that unanimous agreement on the principles is unlikely. Some of the design principles may contradict each other and some may be prioritised over others.

### **Design principles & policy**

Q: If assessment of an ACP is ultimately based on policy, why have design principles?

A: Because design principles ensure that a sufficiently wide range of options are developed and assessed and fed into the process, right from the start.



## 10. Our design principles engagement

Our design principles engagement is taking place via online workshops, public focus groups and email correspondence.

The engagement will be split into two phases:

- Phase 1
  This is the phase you are attending for the workshops planned in September and October
- Phase 2
  This phase will take place in November, where we will present all the feedback we have received and get your final thoughts on our proposed list of design principles

Through airspace modernisation Heathrow will make use of modern navigation technology to enable better aircraft performance, reduce delays and manage traffic in ways that mitigate, where possible, the impact on local communities

## What is a design principle?

CAP1616 requires us to develop design principles to be applied to the airspace change design. Design principles help our airspace designers to create and compare different design options when we reach Stage 2 of the CAP1616 process.

The design principles encompass the safety, environmental and operational criteria and the strategic policy objectives that we seek to achieve through the airspace change.

Design principles can be grouped into broad themes such as:

- Safety
- Policy
- Noise
- Environment
- Technology
- **Operational Performance**

### **Prioritisation**

Discussions aim to identify common priorities amongst stakeholders, although the CAA acknowledges that unanimous agreement on the principles is unlikely: some of the design principles may contradict one another and some may be prioritised over others.

## How are design principles used?

The design options are only evaluated against the design principles in Stage 2A. after that, all formal appraisals are assessed against policy

However, design principles provide a framework for assessing design options at the earliest stage of the design process and ensuring that local priorities are taken into account

Heathrow is aware that you, and other stakeholders, have provided us with information and feedback on some of our previous ACPs. However, each ACP is different and directly applying design principles from a different airspace change (for example, one of Heathrow's previous ACPs) may not be appropriate. Also, priorities and opinions may have changed since Heathrow previously engaged with stakeholders.

The design principles are an opportunity to combine local context with technical considerations for the airspace change. It is important that these elements are considered in the context of each specific airspace change proposal.

## **Current Government Policy**

The next few slides outline some of the existing policies that Heathrow must take into account when carrying out this ACP.

This is the framework we must work within: we will not be debating policy in today's session.

Policies may also be subject to change during the ACP process.



## **Current Policy: Noise & Environment**

### **Noise Policy Statement for England**

The Noise Policy Statement for England (NPSE) was published on 15 March 2010. It sets out the long-term vision of Government noise policy: to promote good health and a good quality of life through the management of noise.

#### Aims of the NPSE:

- a) Avoid significant adverse impacts on health and quality of life;
- b) Mitigate and minimise adverse impacts on health and quality of life; and
- c) Where possible, contribute to the improvement of health and quality of life.



## **Current Policy: Noise & Environment**

### **Air Navigation Guidance 2017**

This document provides guidance to the CAA on its environmental objectives when carrying out its air navigation function, and to the CAA and wider aviation industry on airspace and noise management.

### The Government's key environmental objectives are:

- a) Limit and, where possible, reduce the number of people in the UK significantly affected by adverse impacts from aircraft noise;
- b) Ensure that the aviation sector makes a significant and costeffective contribution towards reducing global emissions; and
- c) Minimise local air quality emissions and in particular ensure that the UK complies with its international obligations on air quality.




## **Current Policy: Noise & Environment**

### Air Navigation Guidance 2017: Altitude Based Priorities

The Government has also set out the altitude-based priorities which should be taken into account when considering the potential environmental impact of airspace changes.

All changes below 7000 feet should take into account local circumstances in the development of the airspace design

Flight paths below 7000 feet should seek to avoid flying over Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONBs) and National Parks where possible



Above 7,000 feet the priority is to reduce CO<sub>2</sub> emissions

From 4,000 feet to 7,000 feet the priority is to limit and, where possible, reduce the number of people affected by aircraft noise – unless this would disproportionately increase  $\mathrm{CO}_2$  emissions

Below 4000 feet the priority is to limit and, where possible, reduce the number of people affected by aircraft noise

## **Current Policy: Performance Based Navigation (PBN)**


Performance Based Navigation (PBN) is key to achieving airspace modernisation.

PBN technology is being introduced across the world, helping to improve the accuracy of where aircraft fly by replacing outdated and conventional navigation systems (which rely on ground-based beacons) with modern satellite navigation.

The UK is required to meet **international obligations** to introduce PBN. The most significant of these is the commitment to the International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO) which requires all 193 member states (countries) to set out plans for adopting PBN.

PBN provides airports with greater flexibility when positioning routes and enables aircraft to fly more accurately, helping to reduce fuel burn and delays, improve operational performance and reduce the number of people affected by noise.

Air Navigation Guidance 2017 requires us to consider the pros and cons of concentrating traffic on single routes versus the use of multiple routes which could provide relief or respite from noise but increase the number of people overflown overall. We also recognise some overflown communities have concerns about the introduction of PBN at Heathrow and we will seek to mitigate the impacts of it.



## **Decarbonisation & Climate Change**

The Government's <u>Decarbonising Transport</u> document includes a commitment to UK airspace modernisation to deliver quicker, quieter and cleaner journeys.

The Government's Airspace Modernisation Strategy sets out the potential to deliver a reduction in planes queuing in holding stacks over the UK and to allow more efficient flight paths. These changes will help to bring emissions reductions and potential noise benefits to those living underneath flightpaths, as well as to reduce delays.

The Government has also recently consulted on <u>Jet Zero: A consultation on our strategy for net zero aviation</u>

The ambition is to decarbonise aviation in a way that preserves the benefits of air travel and maximises the opportunities that decarbonisation can bring.

## Theme 1: Safety



### **Heathrow's Current Position:**

- Our future airspace design must be safe
- The airspace design must meet or exceed all relevant national and international safety standards

### **Discussion Points:**

- What are your thoughts on wording for a safety principle?
- Do you have any thoughts about safety impacts on other stakeholders, such as the impacts on pilot or Air Traffic Control workload, for example?

### **Examples of Safety Design Principles:**

- Must be safe (Heathrow)
- Airspace design must at least maintain, and ideally enhance, aviation safety, by reducing or removing safety risk factors, provided enhancement does not have a disproportionately detrimental impact on other benefits (Gatwick)
- Must maintain (and ideally enhance) current safety standards (London City).
- Be as safe or safer than today for both commercial air transport and general aviation users that are affected by the airspace change (Southampton)

## Theme 2: Policy

### **Heathrow's Current Position:**

- We are committed to delivering airspace modernisation in accordance with the CAA's Airspace Modernisation Strategy and any current or future plans associated with it
- The airspace design must be compliant with all relevant aviation policy, laws and regulations

### **Discussion Points:**

- CAA Policy Design Principle
- Noise Policy Statement for England (NPSE)
- Altitude-based priorities of Air Navigation Guidance (ANG17)
- Future policy changes that may occur between now and implementation
- Are there any other policies you think we should specifically mention in our design principles?

## **Examples of Policy Design Principles:**

- Must meet the 3 aims of the NPSE (Heathrow)
- Must be in compliance with all laws and regulations (London City)
- Must meet the 3 aims of the NPSE, Air Navigation Guidance 2017 and all appropriate Government aviation policies, and updates thereof (Luton)

### **CAA Policy Design Principle**

Subject to the overriding design principle of maintaining a high standard of safety, the highest priority principle of this airspace change that cannot be discounted is that it accords with the CAA's published Airspace Modernisation Strategy (CAP 1711) and any current or future plans associated with it.

# Theme 3: Noise



#### **Heathrow's Current Position:**

- We will seek to limit or reduce the number of people annoyed or disturbed by aircraft noise
- We will seek to limit or reduce adverse health effects associated with aircraft noise

#### **Discussion Points:**

- Should we limit the number of people newly overflown by keeping flight paths similar to today?
- Should we alternate between multiple routes to spread noise?
   (this will increase the total number of people)
- Should we consider different flight paths in the day/night?
- Should we prioritise flying over parks and open spaces rather than overflying areas where people live and work?

#### **Examples of Noise Design Principles:**

- Using more noise efficient operational practices
- Maximising sharing through predictable respite
- Avoiding overflying communities with multiple flight paths
- Minimise the number of people newly overflown
- Minimise total population overflown (Heathrow)
- Should avoid overflying the same communities with multiple routes, and take into account routes of other airports, below 7,000 feet (Luton)
- Should enable continuous climb/descent (Southampton & Luton)
- Ensure a predictable, fair and equitable share of traffic across all routes, through multiple route options and respite routes (Southampton & Luton)
- The airspace design shall aim to limit and where possible reduce the adverse impacts of aircraft noise (Gatwick)
- Should minimise tactical intervention by ATC below 7,000 feet (Luton)



# **Theme 4: Environment**

#### **Heathrow's Current Position:**

- Heathrow recognises that climate change is a significant issue, and we need to play our part in limiting global warming to 1.5 degrees
- We will seek to limit or reduce emissions caused by aircraft operations
- Airspace change provides a significant opportunity to reduce emissions via greater efficiency and lower fuel burn
- We recognise there are trade-offs between carbon and noise, and we will consider the relative impacts for each flight path option

#### **Discussion Points:**

- Should we include respite routes (or longer routes to reduce numbers of people affected) given they are likely to involve greater carbon emissions than more direct flight paths?
- Should we encourage aircraft to climb more quickly to reduce noise impacts further away from the airport, even if this leads to increased carbon emissions?



# **Examples of Environment Design Principles:**

- Must meet local air quality requirements (Heathrow)
- Should minimise fuel and greenhouse gases (RAF Northolt)
- Should minimise air pollution in the local area from aircraft (London City)
- Minimise, and where possible, reduce aircraft emissions, the degradation in air quality and adverse ecological impacts (Southampton)
- Minimise fuel, CO<sub>2</sub>, greenhouse gases per flight (Heathrow)



# **Theme 5: Technology**



#### **Heathrow's Current Position:**

 Our airspace design should be based on the latest navigation technology widely available

#### **Discussion Points:**

- We want to use the latest navigation technology to enable aircraft and aircraft controllers to operate as efficiently as possible. However, some aircraft at Heathrow will not have the highest navigational specification.
- Setting a minimum standard of navigation specification at Heathrow could mean some aircraft/airlines would not be able to access the airport

#### **Examples of Technology Design Principles:**

- Airspace design should adopt the most beneficial form of enhanced navigation standards for arrival and departure routes (Gatwick)
- Must base our technology on the latest navigation technology widely available (Heathrow)
- Must enhance navigation standards by utilising modern navigation technology (London City)
- Adopt the most beneficial form of enhanced navigation standards for arrival and departure routes (Southampton)

# **Theme 6: Operational Performance**

#### **Heathrow's Current Position:**



- Our airspace design must enable us to make most efficient use of our two runways
- Our airspace design should provide hourly throughput levels that ensure we can meet airline and passenger demand at peak times

#### **Discussion Points:**

Having a resilient operation means the airport can recover from non-standard situations such as severe weather or runway closures. This makes the airport and the airspace network more efficient overall with more predictability and fewer delays.

#### **Examples of Operational Performance Design Principles:**

- Must not degrade Heathrow's throughput performance (Heathrow)
- Should promote optimal network performance in collaboration with other airspace users (London City)
- The airspace design should enable aircraft operators to optimise the use of their fleet capabilities to improve operational efficiency and environmental performance (Gatwick)
- Offer flexibility in the route structure to strengthen resilience against adverse weather and network issues that may affect operations at SOU (Southampton)

# **Next Steps**

We will engage with other stakeholders, including industry (airlines/airports etc.), community groups and local authorities within the potentially affected area.




