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1. Introduction

1.1 Airspace Modernisation

- 1.1.1 The UK's airspace is some of the busiest in the world. In 2017 the Department of Transport (DfT) notified aviation stakeholders that, as the demand for aviation is forecast to continue growing, delays and environmental impacts are expected to increase if the UK's airspace is not upgraded to introduce additional capacity.
- 1.1.2 In response, the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) was tasked to develop the UK Airspace Modernisation Strategy (AMS) which was first published in December 2018.
- 1.1.3 The overall programme of changes required to implement the AMS is considered one of the most significant airspace and Air Traffic Management (ATM) developments ever undertaken. Some of the most important changes described in the AMS concern the widespread adoption of satellite-based navigation technology, known as Performance Based Navigation (PBN).

1.2 Airspace Change Process

- 1.2.1 Since January 2018 any changes to airspace are required to follow the CAA's CAP1616 regulatory guidance. CAP1616 outlines a 7-stage process for changing airspace design including community engagement requirements.
- 1.2.2 The airspace change process should be open and transparent. Stakeholders should be engaged by the change sponsor throughout the airspace change process and have the opportunity to submit feedback in relation to the development of the airspace change proposal.
- 1.2.3 The CAA monitors the progress of an airspace change proposal (ACP) against the requirements of the airspace change process at key defined points called gateways. At each gateway, the CAA will assess whether the relevant airspace change process requirements have been mot. The gateways are there to do

whether the relevant airspace change process requirements have been met. The gateways are there to determine whether the process has been followed up to that point, and whether to approve progress to the next stage.

The first 2 stages of Aberdeen Airport's ACP were carried out between November 2019 and December 2022 and are based on the regulations in the fourth edition of CAP1616. In October 2023 the CAA published the fifth edition of CAP1616 and in December 2023 the CAA confirmed that Aberdeen should continue to follow the CAP 1616 Version 4 process requirements up to the Stage 3. From Stage 4 onwards, Aberdeen Airport is required to follow version 5 of CAP1616. As such, this consultation response document will be based on the guidance provided in version 5 of CAP1616.

1.3 Aberdeen Airport's Airspace Change Proposal (ACP) Stage 3 Consultation

- Aberdeen Airport is undertaking an ACP to improve resilience and meet the UK's AMS. A key element of the strategy is to introduce modern satellite-based navigation, called Performance Based Navigation (PBN), by the end of the decade. For Aberdeen Airport, this means offering modern PBN arrival procedures for resilience and training, alongside our current arrival procedures. It also means reviewing our airspace structures to ensure we are using the minimum volume of airspace necessary.
- In January 2024 we submitted our draft proposals for Consultation to the CAA and in March 2024 Aberdeen Airport was approved by the CAA to proceed to Consultation. From Monday 29 April to Sunday 21 July 2024 Aberdeen Airport consulted on our proposals for the ACP. These were:
 - 1. The introduction of modern satellite-based arrival procedures¹ which would be used by a very small percentage of arrivals for resilience and training purposes; and
 - 2. The release of a section of the Controlled Airspace (CAS), which is not used by the aircraft arriving or departing from Aberdeen Airport, for the benefit of other airspace users.
- 1.3.3 18 consultation responses were received during the consultation period and 2 late responses were received shortly after the Consultation closed.

1.4 This document

- 1.4.1 This document is the consultation response document which provides a detailed overview of the consultation, before showing the categorisation of the consultation responses and how Aberdeen Airport has considered those responses when developing the final airspace change proposal.
- 1.4.2 Due to the changes between CAP1616 v4 and CAP1616 v5, the categorisation of the consultation responses can also be found on the CAA Portal here.
- 1.4.3 The document is broken down into the following main sections:

2. Aberdeen Airport's consultation overview - We asked

2.1 Consultation summary

- 2.1.1 The consultation took place over 12 weeks between Monday 29 April Sunday 21 July 2024. In line with the consultation strategy, available here, the consultation was predominantly an online consultation, with online webinar events and a single in-person drop-in event.
- 2.1.2 The CAA requires the use of the online Citizen Space platform for the Stage 3 consultation. Recognising that different stakeholders have differing levels of interest and knowledge of the proposals; Aberdeen Airport employed a tiered approach to the main consultation materials and produced the following core documents shown in Table 1.

- 2.1.3 All the consultation material was uploaded onto the Citizen Space portal, which could be reached via:
 - The CAA's Airspace Change Portal
 - Aberdeen Airport's consultation website
 - Aberdeen Airport website, ACP webpage
 - Links provided in emails to targeted stakeholders
 - QR codes on leaflets and posters provided to targeted stakeholders
 - Social media posts on existing Aberdeen Airport Facebook, X and LinkedIn sites.
- 2.1.4 A deposit location was established at Aberdeen Central Library to house hard copies of the consultation information. This location was publicised on the Citizen Space consultation website and on the Aberdeen Airport airspace website.

2.1.5 To give stakeholders the opportunity to ask questions, we held 4 webinars and 1 public 'drop in' event. Each webinar event targeted specific stakeholder groups, however the information presented at each webinar was the same. Further details can be found in sections 2.8 and 2.9 of this document.

2.2 Consultation Questions

- As part of the consultation, we asked consultees 19 questions. The primary method of responding to the consultation questions was via the Aberdeen Airport consultation page on the Citizen Space Portal. Aberdeen Airport also provided a consultation feedback form as an appendix within the main consultation document. The consultation documentation stated that hard copies would be posted on request to any consultees who were unable to respond via Citizen Space.
- As the consultation was split into two distinct parts, firstly regarding the introduction of the PBN arrivals and secondly regarding the release of a section of Controlled Airspace, Aberdeen Airport structured the online consultation questions to allow consultees to only answer the sections important to them.
- Following the initial introduction questions (1-7), consultees could skip to question 10 if they did not wish to answer questions on the PBN arrival procedures.

 Additionally, question 10 allowed consultees to identify if they were an airspace user or not, and subsequently answer the questions most appropriate for them (either questions 11-15 or 16-18). The list of consultation questions was:
 - 1. Name
 - Email address
 - Postcode
 - 4. Are you responding to this consultation as an individual or on behalf of an organisation?
 - 5. If you are responding on behalf of an organisation, what is the name of that organisation?
 - 6. What is your interest in this airspace change proposal? [multi-choice response]
 - 7. Would you like your name to be published alongside your response?
 - 8. What are your thoughts on the proposal to introduce PBN arrivals?
 - 9. Do you have any further comments you would like to share about the introduction of PBN arrivals at Aberdeen Airport?
 - 10. Are you an airspace user?
 - 11. As an airspace user, how satisfied are you with the proposed change?
 - 12. Can you provide details on why you feel that way?

- 13. As an airspace user, in particular for GA (General Aviation) pilots, can you think of any visual features that could better define the boundary?
- 14. Thinking specifically of Controlled Airspace, do you have any further comments?
- 15. Please select here to move straight to the "Final Thoughts" section
- 16. As a non-airspace user, do you support this proposal?
- 17. Please expand on your answer
- 18. Thinking specifically of Controlled Airspace, do you have any further comments?
- 19. Do you have any further feedback on this Airspace Change Proposal?

2.3 FAQs

- A "Frequently Asked Questions" page was uploaded onto Citizen Space at the start of the consultation. The initial version was produced by Aberdeen Airport based on questions that had been received during Stages 1 and 2 of the CAP1616 process or that Aberdeen Airport felt might be useful for consultees.
- As stated in the Consultation Strategy, Aberdeen Airport planned to update the FAQs during the consultation period, as responses were received, if common themes or questions were identified. There was no requirement to update the FAQ document during the consultation.
- 2.3.3 The FAQ document is available at Appendix A.

2.4 Target Audience

- 2.4.1 Prior to the commencement of the consultation, Aberdeen Airport emailed the existing stakeholders who had previously been engaged during Stages 1 and 2 of the CAP1616 process. The email informed them of the consultation details and provided them with a link to the Citizen Space Consultation website. A list of the known stakeholders is at Appendix B, and copies of the emails distributed to known stakeholders prior to and during the consultation period are available at Appendix C.
- Aberdeen Airport identified "additional consultees" which included representatives from local government, MPs/MSPs, Airlines or who were advised by the CAA to be added to the list of consultees. Further information is available in the consultation strategy. These additional consultees were emailed at the start of the consultation and provided links to the consultation material on the Citizen Space consultation website. Copies of the emails distributed to known stakeholders prior and during the consultation are available at Appendix C.

Aberdeen Airport identified a geographical area where the very limited/negligible impacts of the new arrival routes are likely to be experienced and as part of the proportionate targeted approach to consultation, carried out a leaflet drop to the residents within that region.




Figure 2: Targeted consultee region²

- As the geographical region outlined in Figure 2 did not necessarily encompass whole villages/towns, Aberdeen Airport did not name specific villages, but carried out a mapping exercise to identify the specific addresses within this area who would receive leaflets. This included approximately 164 addresses.
- In addition to the leaflet drop to residents within the targeted area, Aberdeen Airport identified a local golf course (Meldrum House Country Hotel & Golf Course) and an equestrian centre (Ardmeddon Equestrian) and provided them with a poster at the start of the consultation to be displayed, which provided information on where further details could be found.

2.5 Telephone, email and postal address

- 2.5.1 At the start of the consultation a phone number and email address were provided in the consultation material for any consultee who required further information or to request hard copies of the documentation. A postal address was also provided for consultees to write to, or to send copies of feedback forms (free post was available).
- 2.5.2 Aberdeen Airport did not receive any enquires via the telephone number, email or postal address.

2.6 Social media

- Aberdeen Airport utilised existing social media outlets, Facebook, X and LinkedIn to provide a brief outline of the consultation and direct interested parties to the Citizen Space consultation website. Social media posts were made at the start of the consultation and during the consultation to advertise the webinars.
- 2.6.2 In total there were 4 posts on social media, and they provided the following engagement statistics as shown in Table 2.

2.7 Local press

Due to the limited impacts of the proposed change, as part of the consultation strategy Aberdeen Airport made the decision not to use local media channels, such as local newspapers or local radio to inform local communities about the consultation. Widespread broadcast of a relatively small airspace change could have led to apprehension about the proposals from members of the public who are not impacted.

2.8 Online events

- During the consultation, Aberdeen Airport hosted 4 online webinars, using video conferencing software to ensure the events were accessible for as many people as possible. The Aberdeen Airport project team presented the consultation material and attendees were able to ask questions regarding the proposals. Details of the online webinars are shown in Table 3.
- The information presented at all the webinars was the same, however, Aberdeen Airport targeted different stakeholders at each event, to ensure that tailored discussions and questions could take place. The information including dates, times, audience and how to register for the webinars was published on the Citizen Space consultation website and the Aberdeen Airport Airspace website at the start of the consultation.

2.9 In person events

- 2.9.1 Aberdeen Airport held one in-person consultation event. This took place on 21 May 2024 from 1400-2000hrs at the Aberdeen Science Centre, 179 Constitution Street, Aberdeen. This location was chosen due to its access for public transport and parking. The date, time and location were publicised on the Citizen Space consultation website and the Aberdeen Airport Airspace website at the start of the consultation. Information was also included in the emails to stakeholders.
- 2.9.2 The public event was a drop-in format, with attendees able to attend at any point during the event duration. Both technical and non-technical members of the project team were preset to engage and answer any questions. Printed copies of the consultation materials were available and display boards of the material were in situ.
- 2.9.3 To encourage response, digital technology (QR codes and tablets) was available to sign post consultees direct to the Citizen Space website.






Figure 3 Photograph of in person event set up

2.10 Maximising participation

- 2.10.1 As stated in section 2.4, existing stakeholders and additional stakeholders were contacted via email at the start of the consultation, informing them of consultation details and how to respond. They also received emails throughout the consultation reminding them of upcoming webinars, where to find out more information about the proposals and how to ask questions or provide feedback.
- Towards the end of the consultation, Aberdeen Airport also reached out specifically to certain organisations who had previously engaged during Stages 1 and 2 to request responses, these included NATS NERL, Aberdeen Air Traffic Control (ATC), Loganair and the MOD. Copies of the emails are available at Appendix C.

3. Consultation Analysis

3.1 Who responded to our Consultation?

Overall responses

- During the consultation period, a total of 18 responses were received. All responses were received via Aberdeen's Citizen Space portal. No postal responses were received.
- Following the end of the consultation period, we also received 2 further responses (please see below for more details), bringing the **total number of responses** to **20**.
- Out of the 20 responses, **10 responses were from individuals** and **10 responses were on behalf of organisations**. We asked respondents to tell us about their interest in the ACP. Table 4 outlines the areas on interest selected by respondents:

Responses within the targeted area

Our consultation strategy identified a very small area which was targeted with specific leafletting as part of the consultation. Aberdeen Airport did not receive a response from any postcode located within the targeted area. It's important to the note that the consultation highlighted that 'we do not anticipate any material changes to how aircraft arrive today as a result of this ACP'. As such, Aberdeen Airport does not consider the response rate from this area as an indication of the effectiveness of the consultation given the materials and Full Options Appraisal highlighted that there would be no material change for residents within this area.

Responses from known stakeholders

- 3.1.5 Throughout the ACP to date, and within the Stage 3 Consultation Strategy, Aberdeen Airport have outlined the known stakeholders for this airspace change proposal.

Late responses

- 3.1.7 Following the close of the consultation, Aberdeen Airport received consultation response from LoganAir and Aberdeen ATC via the feedback form.
- 3.1.8 Aberdeen Airport carefully considered whether it was appropriate to allow late responses to the consultation. Given LoganAir is one of Aberdeen Airport's major airlines and an airline that could potentially be impacted by the proposals, it was considered appropriate to allow the late response. Additionally, as Aberdeen ATC is responsible for controlling the aircraft arriving and departing at Aberdeen Airport, it was considered essential to incorporate their feedback.
- 3.1.9 In the interest of fairness and transparency we have highlighted the late responses in this section, and within the Consultation Categorisation Document available on the CAA Portal here.

4. Consultation outcome - You said, we did

- 4.1.1 Within this section, we have summarised the responses to each feedback question, highlighting the key themes. We have then included details of the qualitative feedback raised for each question and our response to that feedback.
- Within the tables below, we have included all qualitative feedback provided, unless the respondent has answered in a way to say they have no feedback to that question, for example by saying 'None', 'n/a' or 'Nil'. For the full details of each consultation response received, please see the Consultation Categorisation document on the CAA Portal here. Any feedback which was carried forward for consideration as part of Stage 4 has been highlighted in red.
- 4.1.3 The final conclusions of the consultation feedback which was carried forward to Stage 4 can be found in Table 14.

4.2 Responses to our questions about PBN arrival procedures?

4.2.1 As part of the consultation, we asked two main questions about our proposal to introduced PBN arrival procedures to Aberdeen Airport. These were both qualitative questions.

Responses to '8. What are your thoughts on the proposal to introduce PBN arrivals?'

- 4.2.2 18 out of 20 consultees responded to the question 'What are your thoughts on the proposal to introduce PBN arrivals?'.
- 4.2.3 16 of the responses were broadly supportive of the proposal, with the other 2 responses having no comments or opinion on the PBN arrivals. The responses talked about the benefits of modernising and providing resilience at Aberdeen Airport.
- Table 6 shows the full details of the feedback and our response to question 1 'What are your thoughts on the proposal to introduce PBN arrivals?'.

4.3 Responses to our questions about Controlled Airspace (CAS)

- For the next set of questions around Controlled Airspace (CAS), our Citizen Space questionnaire initially directed respondents to the appropriate set of questions by asking whether they were an airspace user. For those not interested in the CAS proposals, there was also an option to skip the questions and go straight to the final section of the form.
- 4.3.2 9 selected that they were airspace users and were directed to question 11 onwards.
- 4.3.3 10 selected that they were not an airspace user, but they wanted to answer questions about CAS and were directed to question 16 onwards.
- 4.3.4 1 respondent did not respond to the CAS questions and was directed to question 19.

Responses to '11. As an airspace user, how satisfied are you with the proposed change?'

- 4.3.5 9 respondents were directed to question 11 'As an airspace user, how satisfied are you with the proposed change?' and were given the option to select 'satisfied', 'neither satisfied nor dissatisfied' or 'dissatisfied'.
- 4.3.6 All 9 respondents selected that they were satisfied.

Responses to '12. Can you provide details on why you feel that way?'

Following question 11 above, the 9 respondents were asked 'can you provide details on why you feel that way?'. The responses were overall broadly supportive with some noting operational and safety improvements if the CAS was to be released.

5. Conclusion

- As part of the consultation, Aberdeen Airport heard from all key stakeholders including NATS, Aberdeen ATC, an airline, the Ministry of Defence (MoD), and numerous community members and GA representatives. We believe the number of consultation responses was proportionate given the scale and expected impacts of the proposals.
- Aberdeen Airport carefully collated, reviewed and responded to all consultation feedback on the proposals to introduce PBN approaches, for resilience and training, and to release a small section of CAS. For the proposed PBN arrival procedures, we did not receive any consultation feedback which would impact the design. For the CAS proposal, we received three suggestions for visual features which were considered, and one piece of feedback regarding safety.
- As part of the Stage 3 activities in CAP1616 Edition 4, all the consultation feedback received was categorised and submitted in a consultation categorisation document to the CAA for review. CAP1616 (189) required us to categorise the consultation feedback into those 'that may lead to a change in the design and those that could not'. Feedback categorised as 'may impact the final proposal' was carried forward to Stage 4 for further consideration.
- 5.1.4 Following the submission of the consultation categorisation document in October 2024, the CAA reviewed a random selection of the consultation responses and based on that review, accepted that Aberdeen Airport had categorised them fairly.
- Table 14 shows the feedback that was categorised as "may impact the final proposal" in this document and which was taken forward for further consideration in Stage 4. The table shows the question asked, the feedback received and Aberdeen Airport's response.

The Banchory VRP is long established over an area which is considered more prominent than the waterworks. Given this, establishment of a VPR at the waterworks has not been progressed as it would not meet requirements b. and d. of the CAA policy.
		ATC also carefully considered whether a VRP at Alford would be useful to identify the point at which a southbound aircraft at 4000ft can make a left turn to track southeast. However, no prominent feature could be identified other than the town itself and the CAA policy says towns should be avoided.

5.2 Consideration of the requirement for further consultation

- Overall, the feedback received around the PBN arrival procedures and the release of a section of CAS was broadly supportive and none of the feedback impacted the final proposal. Therefore, no changes were made to the PBN arrival procedures or to the boundary of the CAS release as a result of the consultation.
- Given this, Aberdeen Airport has not identified a need to reconsult and intends to continue with this ACP submission. Aberdeen Airport's known stakeholders will be updated by email when this document is published on the Airspace Change Portal.

Frequently Asked Questions

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Airspace Change Process

What is Airspace?

Airspace is the 'invisible infrastructure' in the sky which helps aircraft operate safely. It includes the flight paths that aircraft take when arriving and departing from an airport, which are usually the responsibility of an airport up to 7000ft above ground level. The routes on the airspace network above 7000ft are the responsibility of National Air Traffic Services (NATS).

Airspace can be controlled and uncontrolled; this means that in some areas there are restrictions on which aircraft and/or pilots can fly in the airspace to protect other airspace users such as commercial airliners. To enter most controlled airspace, pilots must get permission from Air Traffic Control. There are different classifications of controlled airspace that have varying requirements. For more information about different types of controlled airspace, please see here.

What is Airspace Change?

Airspace Change is the process through which flight paths, routes, controlled airspace boundaries and controlled airspace classification can be changed. The Department for Transport (DfT) is responsible for all aviation policy in the UK, including airspace. The Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) is responsible for its regulation and for the Airspace Change Process which all airports must follow where changes to airspace are proposed. Aberdeen Airport is responsible for the design of any changes to flight paths into and out of the airport up to approximately 7,000ft, and National Air Traffic Services (NATS) is responsible for changes to airspace above 7,000ft.

What is CAP1616?

The aviation industry is regulated by the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) in the UK, and they ensure that the environmental impact of aviation on local communities is managed through efficient use of airspace. When changes to airspace are proposed, an airport is required to follow the CAA's Airspace Change Proposal (ACP) process, this is known as CAP1616.

CAP1616 is a 7-stage process which places great importance on engaging and consulting on airspace proposals throughout the process with a wide range of stakeholders, including potentially affected communities.

Aberdeen Airport successfully passed Stage 2 of the CAP1616 process in January 2023. More information on Stage 1 and Stage 2 can be found on the CAA's Airspace Change Portal.

Aberdeen Airport's consultation is based on Version 4 on the CAP1616 guidance, which can be viewed here. Once the Airport has passed Stage 3, it will be assessed against Version 5 which came into effect in January 2024.

How does Airspace Change work?

Airspace Change is conducted in line with a process set out by the Civil Aviation Authority, termed CAP1616. Initially, in Stage 1, a 'sponsor' (the party trying to change the airspace) needs to produce a Statement explaining why the change is needed. Design Principles are then worked up in collaboration with key stakeholders.

Stage 2 'Develop and Assess' sees multiple options worked up and then assessed against the Design Principle established in Stage 1. Following this assessment, a shortlist of options is taken to the first of three phases of appraisal called the 'Initial Options Appraisal'. After the Initial Options Appraisal, the options may be shortlisted before moving onto the Stage 3 'Full Options Appraisal'. The full options appraisal identifies the options for public consultation and this consultation forms one of the main parts of Stage 3. This is where we are now.

What is the Airspace Modernisation Strategy?

The Airspace Modernisation Strategy (AMS), also known as CAP1711, is a document published by the DfT and CAA in December 2018. The document describes how the airspace within the UK is reaching capacity and, due to the age of the design, includes features that restrict the aviation industry's ability to improve its operational and environmental performance.

The AMS sets out a new shared objective between the CAA and the DfT for modernising airspace which is to deliver quicker, quieter, and cleaner journeys and create more capacity for the benefit of those who use and are affected by UK airspace.

Why is Aberdeen's ACP no longer part of the Masterplan?

Aberdeen Airport was approved by the CAA to withdraw from the UK Airspace Change Masterplan. Aberdeen Airport was originally part of the wider UK airspace change programme which involved coordination between different airport sponsors who shared interdependencies within the airspace. As the proposal has progressed, it became clear that due to the geographical position of Aberdeen Airport, there were no interdependencies between our proposed changes and those of the other programme participants. Aberdeen Airport remains part of the National Airspace Change Programme, but withdrawal from the Masterplan means we are able to progress independently of the wider changes being proposed by other airports across Scotland and the UK.

Our Proposals

What is Aberdeen Airport proposing and why?

Aberdeen Airport is consulting on two changes to the airspace surrounding the airport. These proposals are part of an industry-wide drive, led by the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) who regulate the UK's airspace, to modernise UK airspace infrastructure.

As part of this consultation, we are asking for your feedback on the following two proposals:

- 1. The introduction of modern satellite-based (PBN) arrival procedures which would be used by a very small percentage of arrivals for resilience and training purposes
- 2. The release of a section of the Controlled Airspace (CAS), which is not routinely used by the aircraft arriving or departing from Aberdeen Airport, for the benefit of other airspace users

More information about our proposals can be found in the Consultation Summary Document.

The PBN arrival procedures proposed as part of this ACP are intended to be operated alongside the existing approaches at Aberdeen Airport and we expect the vast majority (95%+) of arrivals will continue to arrive as they do today. This proposal will not increase the number of arrivals at Aberdeen Airport.

What is Performance based navigation (PBN)?

Performance based navigation (PBN) is a type of navigation that uses satellite-based technology. This is similar to the type of technology used in car sat-navs, or in GPS based sports watches. PBN is being introduced across the world and Aberdeen Airport are required to consider implementing it as part of meeting the requirements of the Airspace Modernisation Strategy.

Where are we now?

We are now in Stage 3, where we have carried out our second appraisal on the remaining options, called the Full Options Appraisal (FOA), and have planned and prepared for this Consultation by producing a Consultation Strategy and this Consultation material. The material is available to view on our Citizen Space Consultation website here.

How has the proposal been developed?

Airspace change options are required to be developed throughout various stages of the CAP1616 process. The table below gives a high level overview of the stage and links to where further information can be found:

How has the proposal been assessed?

As part of Stage 3 of CAP1616 we undertake a Full Options Appraisal (FOA). This is where we assess a baseline "do nothing" pre-implementation scenario and then compare it against the options to understand the benefits and impacts of each option. CAP1616 sets out the assessment categories including Safety, Noise, Greenhouse Gas Emissions/Fuel burn, Air quality, tranquillity, biodiversity, impacts to general aviation, and other costs associated with the change. For more information, please see our <u>Full Options Appraisal</u> document or alternatively there is a summary in the <u>main consultation document</u>.

Implementation (if successful)

When is the proposal likely to be implemented?

If our airspace change proposals are approved, we expect the changes to be implemented in quarter 1 (Q1) 2026.

Will there be a Post Implementation Review?

Subject to CAA decision, the ACP would then move onto Stage 6 implementation. A year after implementation, a Stage 7 post implementation review is undertaken to ensure the ACP is meeting the objectives.

Can the change be reversed if it doesn't deliver the expected benefits?

CAP1616 requires sponsors to be clear with stakeholders the extent to which the proposed airspace change once implemented is reversible if it does not meet the objectives it is designed to achieve as part of the post implementation review at Stage 7.

As this ACP looks to introduce PBN approaches for resilience alongside the existing conventional procedures, it is possible for this change to be reversed if required.

Engagement

What engagement has already been done, and when?

A list of the stakeholder representatives we have previously engaged as part of earlier stages of the process, is available to view **here** in our Consultation Strategy.

The previously engaged stakeholders included relevant parliamentarians, local authorities, National Air Traffic Management Committee (NATMAC), Aberdeen Airport Flight Operations Performance and Safety Committee (FLOPSC), Aviation Industry, Community Councils, and Interest Groups.

How have you determined which stakeholders are relevant at Stage 3?

As the design has progressed through the options appraisal phases of the CAP1616 process, the geographical region of those potentially impacted has evolved; and as we moved into Stage 3 it became evident that with our chosen option the impact on many stakeholders, particularly for communities on the ground, is expected to be very limited.

However, to ensure that we still reach the correct audience for our consultation, we carried out an assessment of where these very limited/negligible impacts of our new arrival routes are likely to be experienced and created a geographical area to identify the audience. These stakeholders, along with our previously engaged stakeholders, will be directly contacted as part of this consultation however we welcome responses from anyone with an interest in the proposal.

What are the timescales for your consultation?

Our consultation began on Monday 29 April 2024, and runs for 12 weeks. During this period, there is an in person drop in event and four online webinars where there will be an opportunity to ask questions. The details of these sessions are below.

The in-person event is open to all and will be a drop-in session on **Tuesday 21 May 2024 between 2pm-8pm** at the **Aberdeen Science Centre, 179 Constitution Street, Aberdeen, AB24 5TU**.

We will then produce a Consultation Response document which summarises the consultation and our response to issues raised. This will also be published on the CAA's Airspace Change Portal.
